ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Here's to over 50 years of conservation! 2021 has been a busy year for the Open Space Council (OSC), and we are happy to report that it has been a success despite a few challenges.

The **Community Stewardship Alliance** held 17 volunteer workdays across St. Vincent, Lower Meramec, and Creve Coeur Parks. Our 7 Ambassadors managed 223 volunteers. These stewards removed over 4 acres of invasive species and planted 175 Trees. Our annual **Operation Clean Stream** and **Trash Bash** land and water cleanups along the Meramec River, River des Peres, and Missouri River Watersheds included 2,106 volunteers. These volunteers removed an average of 30 pounds of trash/person totaling over 25 tons. In addition, they pulled over 15,000 pounds of metal from our land and waterways and marked over 500 storm drain inlets. Operation Wild Lands (**OWL's**) began in 2007. This year's event at Belleview Farm Park is a part of the continued conservation efforts to help maintain the public lands previously donated by OSC. Two additional workdays at The Al Foster Trail engaged youth through education by continuing invasive species removal projects. On these workdays, 75 volunteers removed almost 3 acres of invasive species.

In 2021 through our **Land Trust** program, OSC supported the acquisition of 156 acres of private land adjacent to Greensfelder County Park in Eureka, Missouri. This land was donated to St. Louis County Parks to expand this beautiful open space and provide additional conservation and recreation opportunities.



2021 EVENTS

We hosted two socially distant **Paddle After Dark** Events at Simpson Lake in Valley Park this year. Guests enjoyed music by the lake, refreshments from 4Hands Brewery, and the weather was beautiful. Thanks to all who attended. The proceeds from these events benefitted this year's **Operation Clean Stream** and raised over \$3,600. In addition, for each ticket purchased, our Board of Directors planted a native tree at Emmeneger Nature Park in Kirkwood. They planted over 50 trees! Additionally, we hosted a socially distant **Winter Warmer Hiking Challenge** and **Virtual Cocktail Hour** that raised just over \$1,000 to support our work.
